
Written Directions to Meeting Rooms by Area



Visual Directions-Floor Plan




The Bunker Level

Laura Stewart



Katie Garner, M.Ed. is the author of the best-selling book Secret Stories® Cracking the Reading Code with the Brain in Mind as well as several other popular teacher resources. As an internationally known keynote speaker, author and literacy consultant with thirty years of experience working in classrooms across the US and Canada, Katie shares her passion for infusing neuroscience into both literacy and learning.

Her "backdoor-to-the-brain" approach to fast-tracking phonics skills for reading (via the social and emotional learning systems) shifts the paradigms associated with early literacy instruction. Katie's fast-paced, dynamic presentations spotlight brain-based strategies for aligning existing reading/phonics curriculum with the science of reading and how our brains learn best. Her practical and proven methods for bringing neuroscience into the forefront of literacy and learning have been shared in both lecture and panel discussions at Harvard University and MIT, and have been the subject of numerous professional journal articles.

West Virginia's Teacher of the Year is 20-year veteran teacher, Erin Anderson. She is a fifth-grade teacher at Tennerton Elementary School in Buckhannon, West Virginia. Anderson earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Elementary Education from West Virginia Wesleyan College and a Master of Arts degree in Reading from West Virginia University. She currently serves as secretary of Faculty Senate, mentor for the mileage club, cooperating teacher for student teachers, member of the

superintendent's leadership council, and member of the district's wellness committee. She previously served on the Title I committee, interview committee, and leadership committee at her home school and as adjunct professor at West Virginia Wesleyan College. Anderson served seven years as Director of Membership for the West Virginia Reading Association.

Anderson feels a responsibility to not only prepare her fifth graders for middle school academically, but socially as well. She implements and reinforces the social skills taught in guidance lessons. She takes pride in spending time getting to know her students. Anderson connects with students during Move It Mondays, a mileage club she started at the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year. Students stay after school once a week – rain or shine – to walk and/or run alongside her. The time she spends with students outside the classroom both strengthens relationships and encourages lifelong healthy habits.

Dr. Lockett has taken his storytelling and educational messages to over 4000 audiences in schools, libraries, education conferences, festivals and churches. Mike is a teller of traditional tales in a non-traditional manner. He often adds vocal effects and dialects to his audience participation stories. He has been a performing artist in 31 states and 17 countries including 22 tours of Taiwan and 14 in China. In 2016, he

was a featured storyteller at the 18th Tehran International Festival in Iran. The laughter from audiences and repeat call-backs serve as evidence that Lockett's programs are popular. Mike always reminds everyone that his programs are always clean and high interest. They are planned on each group's needs and are not "canned" one-size-fits-all programs.

The Roots of Reading: Growing Thriving Readers by Following the Science

Teaching children to read is the most pressing educational endeavor of our time. All children deserve equitable access to high-quality, evidence-aligned instruction. Without that instruction, students may fall through the cracks, diminishing their potential to lead rich literate lives. More is known about how to teach reading than ever before, yet often times this evidence base is not provided to teachers nor translated to practice. This session addresses this compelling call to action by supporting teachers in affirming the foundational concepts necessary to guide instruction so that we CAN deliver on the promise of literacy for ALL. This is a no-blame, no-shame zone. We are all in this together, supporting one another in realizing our greatest hope, that all children will learn to read.

How do you build students' reading fluency and stamina while letting them fall in love with reading? You challenge them! Let me share my reading challenge success with you.

Intrinsic motivation. How humans learn. Purpose. Discover powerful books, podcasts and other resources that will inspire and inform—and give teachers and principals strong support for their creative ideas.

By aligning abstract phonics skills with already familiar "universal" experiences and understanding (i.e. having a crush, not getting along, getting hurt, being left out, doing what your mom or babysitter tells you, knowing where and when to be sneaky, etc...) we can leverage learners' social-emotional intelligence to fast-track reading mastery. In this way, we can empower beginning AND struggling readers with ALL of the phonics skills they need to become fearless codebreakers —not just at the reading table, but across the entire instructional day!

"Using Storytelling to Facilitate Content Area Reading in the Middle Grades and High School" with Mike Lockett
Stories and Storytelling can build interest in all content areas. This session will focus on helping improve speaking, listening, vocabulary and comprehension by incorporating the art of reading and telling stories in the classroom.

Dr. Mike Lockett is a lifelong educator, storyteller and an author. He taught middle grade students for 21 years and served as a middle school/high school principal and central office administrator. He has been an educational consultant and teacher trainer.
